Exhibit Hall is located next to the Club House

All entries close Monday, August 21, 2017

All entries must be in place by 11:00 A.M. on Thursday, August 31st.

The Exhibit Hall will be open Wednesday, August 30, 2017 from 12:00 - 8:00 PM and Thursday morning August 31st 8:00 - 11:00 am.

All entries are received upon the express condition that the society shall not be responsible for the loss or damage to such property.

1. All exhibits must have been grown, selected and arranged by the exhibitor.
2. All articles must be made or grown by the exhibitor during the past 12 months.
3. An exhibitor shall not offer for exhibit any item not produced and/or prepared by the exhibitor.
4. No article previously exhibited in this building may be exhibited.
5. The same specimens cannot be entered both as part of a collection and as a plate.
6. Only one (1) entry per class per exhibitor, however, an exhibitor may enter as many varieties in a class as he wishes.
7. Placing will be awarded on the basis of quality of exhibit and the decision of the Judges will be final.
8. If a class is available an item, the "Any Other" class CANNOT be used.
9. No names should be visible on any items.
10. In the event of fewer than 3 entries in any given class, the Management reserves the right to combine comparable classes. If there are sufficient entries, classes may be divided at the discretion of the Judges.
11. The Management reserves the right to remove perished items. If an exhibitor wishes to refresh your items, the exhibitor can do so at the exhibitor's convenience. Please contact the Superintendent(s).
12. The Management reserves the right to reclassify an exhibit.
13. A "DISQUALIFIED" means that the rules were not followed.
14. All premium money will be paid from awards as marked in the Judge's book and NOT from the ribbons that may be attached to exhibits, as ribbons are sometimes misplaced.
15. It is suggested that Fair Exhibitors **"READ & FOLLOW THE RULES"** exactly as given in the Premium Book.
16. YOUTH EXHIBITS are open to any person 9 to 19 years of age as of January 1 of current year. Exhibitors less than 9 years will have their own classes, CHILD EXHIBITS. Please include the age of the exhibitor on all YOUTH and CHILD entries.

FRUIT & VEGETABLES

To ensure adequate display space for all exhibitors, the following Fruit and Farm classes will be limited to the number of placement in each class. The Judge will keep a score card on these exhibits. These will be available from the Superintendent after judging. To receive the listed Premium, a score of 85% must be achieved. All entries must be kept fresh. Passes will be issued on these classes to allow the exhibitors to comply with this rule.

Exhibitors who wish to help oversee the exhibits in the Hall for one (1) 4-hour shift, at some time during the Fair, may volunteer with the Superintendents. Passes will be issued for this purpose.

FRUIT & VEGETABLE DISPLAYS
